





UNIFORM POLICY

BRING YOUR OWN DEVICE

As required in their curriculum, students in GRADES 6-12 are **REQUIRED** to bring their own laptop or Chromebook (with charger) to school **DAILY.** Failure to bring in your device will result in an "F" for the school day.

TABLETS OR PHONES ARE NOT ACCEPTABLE

Important Reminders:

- Keeping their equipment safe and secure. The school is not responsible for lost, damaged, or stolen equipment.
- Managing battery life.
- Using in an appropriate and ethical manner.
- Knowing and adhering to the network use policy.
- Being in possession of only their device and not allowing others to use their device.

INTERNET SAFETY POLICY

ACADEMIC & DIGITAL INTEGRITY

- Parent Monitoring of digital devices (Social Media Accounts and Postings)
- Parent Acknowledgement Form must be signed and returned.
 This form will be received with Opening of School Documents.



CELLPHONE POLICY

Cell Phones and other electronic signaling devices may not be activated inside any classroom or building. Students are permitted to use cell phones during non-instructional minutes consisting of lunch time, passing periods, and before or after school.

Warning- phone must be put away and remain out of sight



1st Offense- Detention, phone is confiscated by teacher and returned to student at the end of the day.

2nd Offense- Detention, phone is confiscated and returned to the parent only.

CODE OF STUDENT CONDUCT

The Code of Student Conduct (COSC) is aligned with local, state, and federal mandates with an emphasis on promoting a safe learning environment to ensure academic success. The Code of Student Conduct sets the standards of conduct expected of students in a purposeful safe learning environment in which the principles of care, courtesy, civility, fairness, acceptance of diversity, and respect for the rights of others is valued. It also addresses the role of the parents/guardians, the students, and school, but also focuses on core values and model student behavior, rights and responsibilities of students, addressing student behavior, and disciplinary procedures.

Furthermore, it should also be noted that behaviors committed on or off the school campus may be violations of the COSC and may also be violations of Florida law. These violations may result in disciplinary actions imposed by local law enforcement authorities, in addition to those of the school/district. The Superintendent, principals, and other administrators shall assign discipline/corrective strategies to students pursuant to the Code of Student Conduct and, where required by law, protect the student's due process rights to notice, hearing, and appeal



ATTENDANCE POLICY

Florida law defines "habitual truant" as a student who has 10 or more unexcused absences within an academic year with or without the knowledge or consent of the student's parent or guardian, and who is subject to compulsory school attendance.

Florida law (Section 1003.436, Florida Statute) defines a full credit as a minimum 135 hours of bona fide instruction in a designated course of study.

PARENT RESPONSIBILITY Florida Statutes, 1003.24 defines the responsibility of parents for the attendance of their child at school and requires them to provide an explanation for any absence from school.

Importance of Attendance Students who attend school regularly:

- Earn better grades
- Feel safe and more confident
- Develop trusting relationships with their peers and teachers
- Are challenged by the rigor of the academic process



ATTENDANCE POLICY

School administration will meet with students and parents when students are in danger of missing too many days, and students will be placed on an attendance agreement. This process will be done to ensure students and parents are aware of the attendance requirements for the school year

Students who exceed 10 absences will be required to make up that time by attending after school, Saturday school, and/or summer school to meet the state requirements for attendance.

Students in grades 9-12 are earning credits toward a high school diploma. The Florida Department of Education mandates a seat time requirement to earn credit for each course. When a student misses more than 10 days in a full-credit course and more than 5 days in a half-credit course, there is a requirement to make those classes up or the student will not earn the credit.



ATTENDANCE POLICY

- Students who are absent from school are required to submit a note to excuse the absence within (3) days upon returning to school will result in an unexcused absence.
- Student grades may be withheld if she/he has:
 - Ten (10) or more accumulated unexcused absences in a year
 Or
 - Five (5) or more unexcused absences in a semester.
 - An Attendance Review Committee screens attendance cases and assigns interventions.

Excused Absences

- Student illness
- Medical appointment
- Death in family
- Religious holiday or mandated service
- School-sponsored event of activity
- Outdoor Suspension

Unexcused Absences

- Any absence that does not fall into one of the excused absence categories.
- All unexcused absences will result in a failing grade being issued for any work missed on the day(s) in question.



CONSEQUENCES OF POOR ATTENDANCE

Students...

- Get penalized by the school administration
- Detention, Saturday School, Summer School
- Miss important instructional time
- Develop negative feelings towards self and school
- Are sometimes unsupervised and out of safety
- Engage in activities that parents might not approve
- The school must forward the truant's name to the Florida
 Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles, which will then
 suspend (or deny an application for) the student's driver's license or
 learner's permit

Parents are held liable for absences/ excessive tardiness.



CURRICULUM

The classical education approach is an educational philosophy and methodology that is often characterized by a structured curriculum, a focus on the liberal arts, and a systematic progression through different stages of learning.

The Grammar Stage (Grades K-5):

In this stage, which typically covers the early years of education, the emphasis is on acquiring fundamental knowledge and skills. Students learn the basics of language, grammar, mathematics, history, and science. The goal is to provide students with a solid foundation of knowledge that they can build upon in later stages.

The Logic Stage (Grades 6-8):

Also known as the middle years, this stage focuses on developing critical thinking skills and the ability to analyze and evaluate information. Students learn formal logic, and argumentation, and begin to explore more complex subjects. The goal is to teach students how to think critically and reason logically.

The Rhetoric Stage (Grades 9-12):

This stage, which typically covers high school years, emphasizes effective communication and expression. Students learn the art of persuasive writing, public speaking, and debate. They also delve deeper into subjects such as literature, history, philosophy, and advanced mathematics. The goal is to cultivate eloquence and the ability to express ideas convincingly.

The classical education approach also places a strong emphasis on the liberal arts, including subjects such as literature, history, philosophy, mathematics, and science. These subjects are considered essential for developing a well-rounded individual with a broad understanding of the world. In addition to the subject matter, the classical education approach often emphasizes the development of virtues and character. It aims to foster a love for learning, intellectual curiosity, and a sense of moral responsibility.



CURRICULUM

- The school's curriculum promotes college readiness and will encourage your child to attain rigor in their curriculum.
- Middle school students are eligible to take high school credits.
- High school students are eligible to take Honors Courses and Dual Enrollment through MDC.



MDG DUAL ENROLLMENT

Dual enrollment is a program that allows students currently attending ABF Academy to simultaneously enroll in college courses. The credits that students earn at MDC count toward high school graduation and can also be applied to a college degree or certificate.
